<b>Generation 1.5</b>	The term Generation 1.5 refers to immigrants who were brought to the United States as young children and identify as American. <b>DREAM Act</b>	The Development, Relief and Education of Alien Minors Act (DREAM Act) is a bipartisan federal legislation proposal. <b>Plyler v. Doe</b>	According to the U.S. Supreme Court ruling in 1982 (Plyler v. <b>Deferred Action</b>	Deferred action means that the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) agrees not to start deportation proceedings against an individual. <b>DAPA &amp; Expanded DACA</b>	On November 20, 2014, President Obama announced the DACA Expansion & Deferred Action for Parents (DAPA).
